The Editor Writes —

MANY readers will have seen the recent announcement that 20,000,000 parcels have been despatched by the Post Office to prisoners of war in Europe since the time of Dunkirk. Of this gratifying total, 16,750,000 were sent by, or through, the British Red Cross—14,000,000 of them food parcels. The rest contained chiefly tobacco, cigarettes and books sent privately through holders of permits.

Sent post free in Post Office mail-bags at the rate of 20,000 bags a week, parcels are stored in warehouses on their arrival in Lisbon until ships are available to take them on to Marseilles, the next stage of their journey to our men. Among the many whom we have to thank for the success of this complicated yet vital service are the officials of the Portuguese Post Office. They undertake the Lisbon storage and re-forwarding work free of charge.

Soap Supplies

After this month, soap will no longer be included in the standard Red Cross food parcels. Instead, it will be going to maintain a common "pot" in Geneva, whence it will be supplied to each camp according to the camp's requirements, and these vary considerably, of course, according to the local occupation—a man in the mines needs more washing than a carpenter.

Laundry Experience

Whether Stalag Luft VI

will be asking for more or less soap I cannot yet forecast; but an inmate writes to say that there is now a communal laundry installed in the camp. "Providing the stuff wasn't too dirty when it went, it comes back reasonably clean," he says. But there are no drying facilities, and "outdoor drying is impossible as it is either wet or freezing here in winter."

"So you run the clothing into a Red Cross food parcel box and shove the soggy mass on top of the stove for a few days, stirring it up from time to time. When at the end of the process you put on the article it looks a mess, but anyhow—it's been to the laundry!"

German Censors' Stamps

A certain amount of confusion is caused through next of kin mistaking the German censor number on letters and cards for the number of the section of the camp in which a prisoner is

interested. I have seen many such cases recently, particularly over what is taken to be a camp of the name of "218 Stalag XVIII." The "218" has in this case always turned out to be the German censor's number.

This creates particular difficulty when the letters are not censored in the camp in which the prisoner is actually interned. It should be realised that the number shown after the printed words "Lager-Bezeichnung" is the prisoner's address, and not any other number which may be stamped elsewhere on the card.

Officers from Italy

Interesting details have arrived recently from Odag VIIIIF, the new camp for officers. There appears to be about a thousand of them there, all—with the exception of a hundred or so—transferred from Italy. "It is not yet fully organised, library, sports gear, etc., being non-existent," writes one of them. "At present we are accommodated in one large four-storey building with central heating and electric light."

There is plenty of room for exercise at Odag VIIIIF including a gymnasium and swimming pool, while other needs are served by an orchestra and a dramatic and a law society—both "very strong."

The German food is by common consent an improvement on the Italian menu, and Red Cross parcels appear to be arriving now regularly. Satisfactory, too, is the report that "I have been issued with battle-dress, boots, socks, set of underwear, pullover, soap and shaving soap..." from a man writing at the end of January.

No. 15 PARCEL

For P.O.W.s Transferred from Italy to Germany

PLEASE note that the advance of six weeks which may be made in the date of despatch of the No. 15 parcel (referred to in paragraph 4 of the revised instructions about parcels for prisoners transferred from Italy to Germany on page 10 of The Prisoner of War Manual for February, 1944) is only applicable to No. 15 labels issued under new earlier regulations which were valid for six months after the despatch of the first parcel sent to Germany.

The advance may not be made in cases in which the No. 15 (for 1944) label is already valid for six months after the despatch of the No. 15 (first posting date) parcels.

NEXT-OF-KIN PARCELS

Next of kin are reminded that quarterly parcels should be sent to be despatched to prisoners of war unless both the prisoner of war number and the camp address are known.

The only exceptions to this rule are parcels for Distinguished Allied Forces hospitals, in which prisoner of war numbers are not allocated.

INCOME-TAX RELIEF FOR P.O.W.s

As letters have appeared in the Press about income-tax relief for prisoners of war, a matter which is naturally of interest to their next of kin, we hope to publish an authoritative statement on the subject in our next issue.

PLEASE be sure to mention your Red Cross reference number whenever you write to us. Otherwise delay and trouble are caused in finding previous correspondence.

Stalag XVIII

Is Stalag XVIII a hospital camp? According to the map, I think it is.

No. If you will look again at the Red Cross map, you will see that it says that the hospital "H.A. Vienna" is attached to the camp "Stalag XVIII"; not that the camp itself is a hospital.

Sending Money Home

My son, who is working in a brick factory, says he will be sending home £4 of his wages. Isn't it impossible for a prisoner of war to send money out of Germany?

No. We understand that an arrangement has been made whereby prisoners will be allowed to remit to their country money which they have saved during their internment.

Prisoner's Pay

Does my husband draw full pay while he is a prisoner of war?

You should apply to your husband's paymaster for this information.

Cookery Book

Do all prisoners receive the cookery book you mentioned in your last issue?

Supplies are sent to all the camps, but not in sufficient numbers for each prisoner to have his own copy.

Textbooks for Tailor

My husband is anxious to continue his profession as a tailor. Can textbooks on this subject be sent to the camp?

Yes. You should write to the Red Cross Educational Books Section, New Bodleian Library, Oxford, about this.

His Naval Coat

Can I send a naval coat to my son, an officer in the Merchant Navy, now a P.O.W. at Mlad?

Yes. I may send it in a next-of-kin parcel.

Telegram to Switzerland

May I send a telegram to my son, who was formerly a prisoner in Italy and is now interned in Switzerland?

Yes. Ask for information about this at the Post Office.

Stamped Reply

May I suggest that when writing to the Red Cross we all enclose a stamped addressed envelope (or a stamp) if a reply

is needed; a small stamp in return for all they do for us and our loved ones?

The idea is a kind and thoughtful one. It would save much trouble, as well as expense, if generally adopted.

His Parcels

My son has been a prisoner for nearly a year and has not yet received any of his parcels. To whom should I write enquiries?

The delay may be due to your son having been moved from the camp to which his first parcel (or parcels) was addressed. The necessity for forwarding them would naturally cause a certain amount of delay. It is not possible to make enquiries about individually addressed parcels while they are in transit; but experience proves that the great majority of parcels do eventually reach the prisoners safely.

Wool

I have sent my son knitting needles and wool. If so, may I use the coupons you send me for the wool?

Yes. Knitting needles and wool are included in the list of permissible articles in the booklet sent out to next of kin every quarter with the label and coupons. Coupons may be used to purchase the wool, and must be accounted for in the next issue.

His Cough Cure

My husband has asked me to send his favorite cough mixture. Could your organization send it to him?

Remedies for coughs and colds, as well as other ailments, are sent to the camps for administration by the medical officer; but if you are particularly anxious that your husband should have the mixture to which he is accustomed, you should write to the Invalid Comforts Section of the Prisoner of War Department, Wimborne House, Allington Street, S.W.1.

Powder for Intercure

I would like to send a box of powder to my sister who is a civilian interned. Is this possible?

Yes. Toilet and face powder may be sent in next-of-kin parcels.
